

Management Aptitude Test December 07, 2008

Enthusiastic, confident, happy, smart, over smart, depressed, nervous, serious, careless, discussing the coming tests, giggling with friends, mature, childish, discussing the MAT, up-to-date, rough and tough, intelligent, sincere, curious, chewing the bubble gum, shivering with cold, drops of sweat on the forehead, clever, with attested photographs, without attested photographs, before time, on time, late, friends wishing best of luck to each other, hi and byes

This is how we can define the Young and Fresh faces gathered on the Sunday morning to write the MAT.

The common thing was the hope and dreams in the eyes for the future. The MAT held on 07 December, 2008 (Sunday) was not just a written test, but an effort made to make the future better, for the youth assembled at various centres of 72 different cities, all over India.

MAT was the fourth entrance test of the MBA entrance test season after, IRMA, CAT and IIFT. Lakhs of students prepare and appear for the test each year. More than 400 institutes are affiliated with the test. Considering December 2008 MAT particularly there are 288 institutes that taking this MAT scores.

The evolution of MAT is clear - after removing sections in December 2007, the September 2008 MAT was with jumbled questions. December 2008 MAT was on similar line of September 2008 MAT. There were total **200 questions** to be solved in a time span of **150 minutes**. Four alternative were provided for each questions. **40 questions each on Reading Comprehension and English Usage (RC and EU), Quantitative Aptitude (QA), Logical Reasoning (LR), Data Interpretation and Data Sufficiency (DI and DS) and General Knowledge (GK)**. The questions were jumbled-up.

It was declared in the instruction provided in the paper at the last page that each correct answer will carry one mark, while there was a negative marking of 0.25 marks for each incorrect answer. Total thirteen different sets of test booklets were available there.

Overall level of difficulty of the paper was easy. 18-20 questions from LR, 15-17 questions from GK, 15-17 questions from QA, 15-17 questions from DI & DS and 6-8 questions from EU should have to attempted first. Ideally a student who is good to select the questions to solve, could attempt 71 to 75 questions in the first hour itself.

Disclaimer: All this information has been memorised by PT students. We are merely reproducing it here in fragments to ensure that the huge community of students eagerly waiting to see an objective comparison of their performance gets the right picture.

Expected Cut-Offs – An score of 105+ (out of 160 i.e. excluding GK) should be good to getting AMITY, BIM Tech., Christ and some other top B- Schools.

The questions from the areas like **Numbers (4), Fractions (2), SI and CI (1), Time Speed and Distance (including Trains and Boats & Streams) (6), Races (3), Averages (2), Percentages (4), Work and Time (including Pipes and Cisterns) (3), Profit and Loss (1), Mixtures, Profit and Loss (3), Calendar (1), Ratio and Proportion (1), Mensuration (3), Simple Applications of Trigonometry (4), Probability (1), Application of Derivatives (1)** were the representative of QA area. The questions were of moderate level of difficulty. For a well prepared student on an average **not more than 1-1.5 minutes** would be required to solve one question of this area.

To check the students' logical and analytical abilities there were questions on **Direction Sense (4), Calendar (1), Relations (2), Linear and Matrix arrangements (6), Conclusions-Statements (4), Assumptions-Statements (4), Coding-Decoding (5), Course of Action-Statements (3), Inferences-Statements (5), Visual Reasoning (4)** and **series (2)**. Excluding the questions based on relations, course or action-statements, inference-statements and two questions of visual reasoning all other questions were of easy. One could attempt 28-30 questions in a time span of 25 to 30 minutes from this area.

There were total **four RC** passages. Total **20 questions** were asked on these passages. The themes of the RC passages were on **Recent Recession and the Economy of India, World Wide Economic Slowdown, Body Clocks & ageing and Experience and Arts**. The length of the passages was of approx. **1100, 400, 450 and 900 words respectively** and **6, 5, 6 and 4 questions were asked on the passages respectively**. The questions asked were direct and easy.

From EU area there were questions on **Fill in the Blanks - two blanks (4), Identify the Best way of Writings (4), Analogies (4), Para Jumble (4)** and **Critical Reasoning (4)**. The questions were of moderate level of difficulty.

Note: The figures in the bracket after the topic is representing the number of questions of that particular topic in the paper).

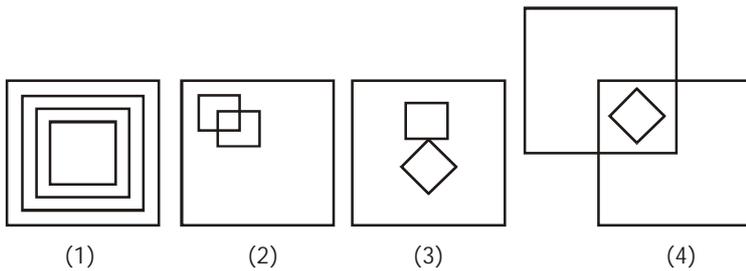
The GK questions were a mixture of easy and moderate level of difficulty. The questions were on dynamic as well as traditional GK. There were questions on Economics, Current Affairs, Awards and Prizes, Business and Appointments. Some of the questions like; who is the present president of USA?, Who is the brand ambassador of BSNL?, TATA's Nano project is shifted to which state from West Bengal?, Question of Nobel Peace Prize award, "Pure Banking, Nothing else" is a punchline of etc. were easy questions. While some of the questions were subject specific like; What is 'Financial Inclusion'?, Question on Article 19? etc. **Some of the GK questions were directly from the PT education material**. Since this area was only to pass and the marks of this will not be include in merit, **an attempt of 20-22 questions will be sufficient to achieve the cut-off for this area**.

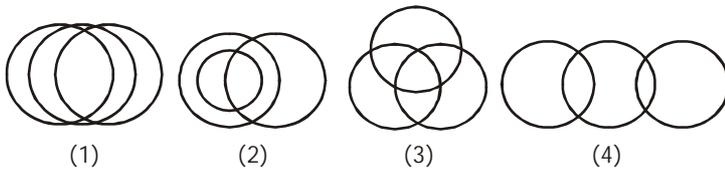

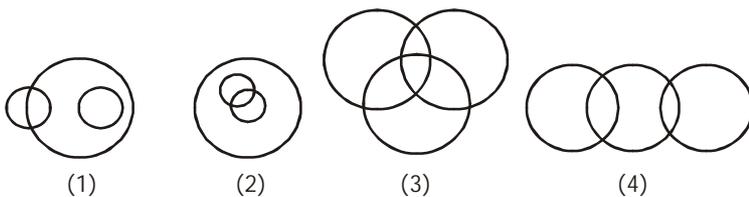

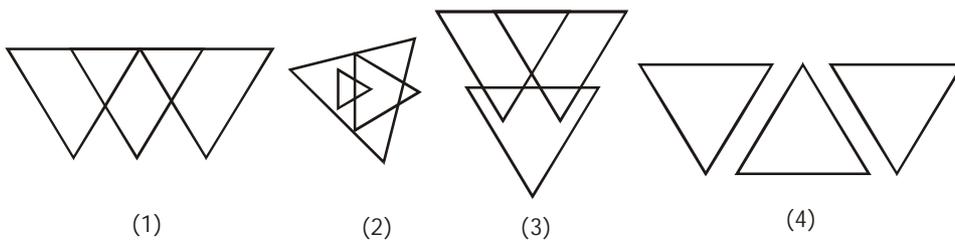
